VACCINATING MALAYSIAN TEENAGERS

MALAYSIA BEGINS VACCINATING TEENAGERS



Malaysia will begin vaccinating teenagers under 18 next week (beginning the week from September 6, 2021), starting with East Malaysian state of Sarawak, says new Health Minister Khairy Jamaluddin Abu Bakar.

"We will start with teens in Sarawak, as the state has reached its benchmark of 80% vaccinated adults," he said on Saturday, September 4, 2021.

The Health Minister added that the Ministry will set up a target for adolescents vaccination according to the supply of vaccines it gets."

"I am hoping that as many teens as possible will get vaccinated in the next 100 days."

"We want that at the start of the school term next year, all teens have completed their vaccinations."

So far the government has only approved the usage of Pfizer BioNTech vaccines for adolescents between the ages of 12 and 17.

Meanwhile, Sarawak state Deputy Chief Minister, Amar Douglas Unggah Embas said, Sarawak will start giving COVID-19 vaccinations to teenagers below the age of 18 from Wednesday, September 8, 2021.



1.5 MILLION CHILDREN LOST PARENTS TO COVID-19

During the first 14 months of the pandemic, an estimated 1.5 million children worldwide experienced the death of a parent, custodial grandparent or other relative who cared for them, as a result of COVID-19, according to a study published in The Lancet on Tuesday (July 20, 2021).

The orphanhood estimates are drawn from mortality data from 21 countries that account for 77% of global COVID-19 deaths and from the United Nations Population Division.

"From every two COVID-19 deaths worldwide, one child is left behind to face the death of a parent or caregiver," Dr. Susan Hillis from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention COVID-19 Response Team, who led the study said in a statement.

The number of COVID-19 orphans will increase as the pandemic progresses, she added.

There is an urgent need to prioritize these children and "support them for many years into the future," Hillis said.

Said study co-author Lucie Cluver of Oxford University, "And we need to respond fast because every 12 seconds, a child loses their caregiver to COVID-19."

Children Less Affected By Long COVID, Says British Study

According to a British study, children very rarely experience what had come to be known as Long COVID-19, when symptoms can last several weeks or even months. The vast majority of young people



take less than a week to recover. Only a small percentage of children have been found to still have symptoms eight weeks after infection.

Six days. That's the average time it takes a child to recover from COVID-19, according to findings from King's College London.

The number of children still showing symptoms between four and eight weeks is "low".

A total of 258,790 children aged 5-17, participated in the study, which was published in the journal Lancet Child and Adolescent Health. Data came from reports made by parents and caregivers via a mobile app. Between September 1, 2020 and January 24, 2021, 1734 youths reported a positive PCR test after experiencing symptoms.

Their health status was reported on and tracked until recovery. On average, children aged 12 to 17 years take

slightly longer to recover from COVID-19, one week, compared to five days for those aged 5 to 11 years. Of the 1734 youths who tested positive, 4% had symptoms for 4 weeks or more and 2% for more than 8 weeks.

Some 84% of children with long COVID reported feeling tired at least once during their recovery. Two other symptoms were prominent: headaches, often reported early in the disease and loss of smell, somewhat later.

"It is reassuring that the number of children experiencing long-lasting symptoms of COVID-19 is low. Nevertheless, a small number of children do experience long illness with COVID-19 and our study validates the experiences of these children and their families," outline Professor Dr. Emma Duncan of King's College London, lead and senior author of the study.

"Our data highlight that other illnesses such as cold and flu can also prolong symptoms in children and it is important to consider this when planning for paediatric health services during the pandemic and beyond," explains Michael Absoud, a senior author of the study.

In his conclusions, the senior lecturer at King's College London warns about the "prevalence of these illnesses" increasing with the loosening of preventive measures.

Put Obese Children Under The Knife To Cut Diabetes Risk, Say Experts



Hundreds of obese children and teenagers should be given weight loss surgery to reverse their diabetes, experts say.

Britain's obesity crisis means almost 800 patients under the age of 18 are now receiving treatment for type-2 diabetes, with cases among young children as young as six.

Type-2 diabetes normally occurs among overweight adults, often in middle age, after decades of weight gain. Nine in 10 cases are fuelled by excess weight. But soaring obesity rates in under - 18s have seen the number of young children with the condition more than double in five years.

Experts are now calling for young people to be offered operation like gastric bypasses and bands in a bid to prevent long-term damage.

Surgeon Andrew Beamish, an honorary senior lecturer at Swansea University, said children should be offered surgery soon after being diagnosed.

"We need to catch diabetes (in young people) early and we need to treat it with an operation," he told the virtual Diabetes UK Professional Conference. "This is a much more aggressive disease that progresses much more rapidly than in adults. We need to make sure we shut the gates before the horse bolts."

There were 790 under-18s receiving treatment for type-2 diabetes from a paediatrician in England and Wales in 2018/2019, - up from 340 in 2013/2014, figures from the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPH) show.

Children as young as six have been diagnosed with type-2 diabetes and the number of 13 and 14-year olds with the condition jumped 39% between 2017/2018 and 2018/2019. Untreated or poorly managed diabetes can lead to serious health problems, including heart attacks, strokes, kidney failure, blindness and amputation.

But Dr. Beamish said common treatment for type-2 diabetes such as medications and insulin therapies, are not effective at preventing damage from the condition in children as in adults.

Studies suggest these 'first line' treatments stopped working for one in five obese teenagers within a year, and for more than half within five years. Weight-loss surgeries such as gastric bands, can reverse diabetes for up to nine out of 10 patients who undergo it, but research suggest it works best when they have only had the condition for short period of time.

PHILIPPINE POLIO FREE AGAIN AFTER VACCINE CAMPAIGN



The Philippines is once again polio free, the World Health Organization (WHO) said Friday (June 11, 2021) after a successful vaccination campaign that has raised hopes for COVID-19 inoculations in a country plague by mistrust of jabs.

Polio re-emerged in the country in 2019, nearly two decades after its last cases were detected, sparking nationwide effort to immunise millions of children against the crippling disease.

The Health authorities said they have not detected the virus in a child or the environment in the past 16 months.

"We are celebrating freedom from polio," said Dr. Rabindra Abeysinghe, WHO representative in the Philippines. More than 80% if vaccinated children were immunised in the nationwide effort, which Dr. Abeysinghe said was "adequate to interrupt the transmission."

The 2019 outbreak began shortly after deadly dengue fever and measles epidemics and as vaccination coverage plunged partly due to the botched roll-out of dengue shot a few years earlier.

Polio is highly infectious and can lead to paralysis and even death. There is no known cure.

DELTA VARIANT

Delta Variant Not Specifically Targeting Children: WHO

The Delta variant of the coronavirus is not specifically targeting children, the World Health Organization (WHO) said Friday (July 30, 2021).

The WHO's COVID-19 technical lead, Maria Van Kerkhove said the evidence showed that the variant first detected in India was rather being transmitted among people who were socially mixing.

"Let me be very clear: we are not seeing the Delta variant specifically target children," the US expert told a press conference.

Delta has now being detected in 132 countries and is more transmissible than earlier versions of the virus, including other variants of concern.

The UN health agency said, work was under way to gain a better understanding of the dynamics of Delta and why it is more transmissible.

"There are some suggestions that the variants specifically targetting children, but that actually is not the case. What we are seeing is that the variants will target those who are socially mixing," Van Kerkhove said. "What we do see is that the variant that are circulating will infect people if they are not taking the proper precautions," she added, referring to measures such as physical distancing and avoiding gathering in poorly ventilated, crowded indoor spaces.

The WHO published a plan detailing ways in which schools can reopen and stay open in safety.

"But do we really need to drive down transmission in the communities to make sure that they can open safely," Van Kerkhove said.


World Breastfeeding Week 2021 Activities From SINGAPORE





The Dr. Perla D. Santos Ocampo Professorial Lecture was one of the highlights of the convention. Dr. Carmencita Padilla, Chancellor of University of the Philippines Manila, delivered the lecture on "Personalized Medicine and Pharmacogenomics in Gastrointestinal Diseases".

The other scientific lectures were delivered by the esteemed speakers that focused on providing updates on topics on gastroenterology, hepatology and nutrition that are commonly encountered in the clinics. Dr. Vicente Belizario, Jr. was a guest speaker who shared his expertise on the facts of intestinal parasitism. The PSPGHAN speakers of the convention were a combination of senior and younger colleagues.

Resource materials such as Bristol stool chart, Stool color card, Pinggang Pinoy and the 2020 PSPGHAN Guidelines for Health Care Professionals on the Treatment of Acute Gastroenteritis with no signs of dehydration were posted and made accessible for the attendees.

The society also encourages participation of young scientists in the conduct of research. Twelve researches participated in the e-poster presentation. The best research was chosen to receive the first "Dr. Arturo Ludan Research Award". A video tribute dedicated to honor one of the pillars of the Society, Dr. Ludan, was presented in the closing ceremonies.



The Organising Committee was headed by Dr. Ma. Charina Dizon with the support from PSPGHAN President Dr. Marilou Tan and the Board of Trustees. The first virtual PSPGHAN Convention was a great success despite the challenges of the pandemic. The convention registration fee was waived to more than 5000 delegates who attended the virtual convention.
